







How to report hate crime

- 1. Call Greater Manchester Police on 101. If it's an emergency always call 999.
- 2. Visit the GMP website (<u>www.gmp.police.uk</u>) and fill in the online reporting form.

Fill in the form on the True Vision hate crime reporting site for England and Wales.

- 3. Get in touch with the Partnership Teams. A list of your local experts can be found on the GMP website.
- 4. Visit a reporting centre. These are independent, non-police centres that allow you to report events in total confidence. If you don't want to talk to anyone, you can pick up a self-reporting pack. For details, select the "Hate Crime reporting centre tab" on the GMP website for your local area.
- 4. Call Crimestoppers with information relating to a hate crime. For example, following a police appeal for witnesses after an incident. They'll not ask for your name and your call is not traced or recorded. Contact them on 0800 555 111 or visit the Crimestoppers website: www.crimestoppers-uk.org
